## Safety and Legal Considerations

### Age Restrictions

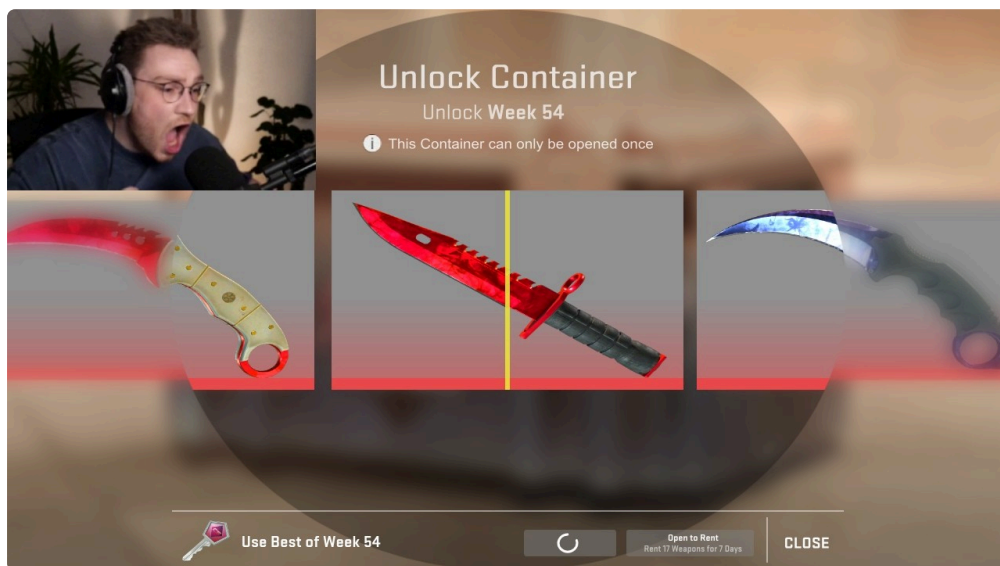
A lot of jurisdictions need users to be a minimum of 18 years old (or 21 in the United States) to take part in real-money gambling. Trustworthy case websites enforce this by asking for ID confirmation throughout the deposit procedure.

### Licensing and Regulation

Case websites operate in a grey location of online betting law. Some hold licenses from recognized authorities (e.g., Malta Gaming Authority, UK Gambling Commission), while others rely on "provably fair" algorithms to construct trust without an official licence. ### Skin Gambling Risks
