

Jessup rarely announces itself in the dramatic way some Maryland destinations do. It does not lean on a polished waterfront promenade or a postcard downtown, and that is part of its appeal. Jessup feels practical, rooted, and workmanlike, a place shaped by roads, rail lines, warehouses, neighborhoods, and the steady routines of people who commute, cook, shop, repair, and gather here every day.
