- **Prize:** Multiple players drop skins into a central pot. Each skin contributes to the player's general "ticket" weight. A random draw chooses a winner, implying players who transfer more have a higher statistical chance of winning the entire pot.
- **Case Opening:** Simulates the in-game case opening experience but frequently with substantially much better (or at least transparently specified) chances than the official Valve cases.
