Which pests are most apt to appear initially in Hamilton?

Cockroaches can be harder to detect at first because they hide during the day. Early cockroach sightings in kitchens, bathrooms, or near drains are important. Seeing even one cockroach can suggest a deeper issue. Look for small dark droppings, egg cases, shed skins, and activity around warm, moist areas.

Ants often appear as paths near food, sinks, or cracks in walls and floors. Ant trails are a clear sign that workers have located food sources and are communicating the route to the nest. While some ant problems seem minor, repeated trails can point to a larger colony and potential structural gaps.

Other seasonal pests can also become early problems. **Wasp nests** may start small in eaves, soffits, or sheds. If you notice early nest construction, it is easier to address before the colony expands. In some areas, **wildlife intrusion** from squirrels, raccoons, or other animals can also begin with noises in the attic or signs of disturbed insulation.

- **Mice:** little droppings, slight bite marks, signs of mice near stored food
- **Rats:** larger feces, stronger odours, visible damage
- **Cockroaches:** seeing cockroaches, egg cases, molted skins, kitchen activity
- **Ants:** ant lines around wash areas, benches, and entry points

Where should Hamilton homeowners check for pest activity?
