When a secret is utilized on a case, an algorithmic live roulette spins through various tiers of weapon finishes. The likelihood of unboxing items is greatly manipulated towards lower-tier products, making high-tier drops incredibly uncommon and valuable.

Noteworthy Recent and Classic Cases

The Economics of Case Openings

The CS: GO/CS2 economy works similarly to a real-world stock market. Costs are governed simply by supply and demand.



- **The Active Drop Pool vs. Rare Drop Pool:** When a case is relocated to the "Rare Drop Pool" (discontinued active drop), its supply stops increasing naturally. As a result, as players open them in time, the staying supply diminishes, and the cost of the case frequently increases.
- **Drift Values and Wear:** Every skin is appointed a float worth ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, identifying its condition (Factory New, Minimal Wear, Field-Tested, Well-Worn, and Battle-Scarred).
- **The Trade-Up Contract:** Players can trade 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier, providing a secondary usage for undesirable, low-tier case drops.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Can I still open CS: GO cases in Counter-Strike 2?

Yes. All tradition CS: GO cases, keys, and weapon skins transferred over perfectly to Counter-Strike 2. The inventory system remains [CS2skin](#) totally intact, and skins even gain from the improved lighting and texture details of the Source 2 engine.

What is the rarest item you can unpack from a case?

Is it rewarding to open cases?

Statistically, **no**. The expected financial return of opening a CS: GO/CS2 case is lower than the cost of the key and the case combined. Valve designed the system primarily for entertainment instead of investment. A lot of seasoned gamers suggest purchasing specific skins directly from the Steam Community Market or third-party marketplaces instead of betting on case openings.

How do I get cases for free?

Players can earn passive case drops merely by playing on official or neighborhood servers with VAC secured. Weekly care plans typically enable players to select specific products, consisting of active-pool weapon cases, simply by leveling up their profile once each week.
