Valve has actually since implemented trade holds (a 7-day waiting duration for traded products) and upgraded its Terms of Service to explicitly restrict the commercial use of Steam accounts for gambling. In spite of these efforts, the market remains active, running through complex workarounds and cryptocurrency integrations.
