

Jupiter has a way of feeling both rooted and easygoing, which is part of why people remember it long after they leave. The town sits at the northern edge of Palm Beach County, close enough to the rush of South Florida to stay connected, but far enough away to keep a sense of shape and identity that never fully dissolves into sprawl. Visitors notice the coastline first, usually, the clean sweep of sand, the water that shifts color with the weather, the lighthouse standing watch over the inlet like a fixed point in a place that otherwise changes with the tides.
