- **API Restrictions:** By restricting automated trade bots and imposing trade cooldowns, Valve has made it considerably harder for platforms to process immediate deposits and withdrawals.
- **Account Bans:** Users caught utilizing their Steam inventories for business gambling operations risk having their individual Steam accounts permanently banned, leading to the loss of their entire game and skin libraries.

In spite of these efforts, the need remains so high that brand-new platforms constantly emerge to change those that shut down.
