StatTrak™ Items

Any weapon unboxed has a roughly **10% chance** of being a StatTrak™ variation. These items include a little LED screen embedded on the weapon that tracks the variety of confirmed eliminates made by the gamer using that particular weapon. Normally, StatTrak™ weapons command a greater cost on the marketplace, though exceptions exist for specific high-tier collector knives.
