Classified (Rare)	~ 3.20%	Pink
Covert (Extraordinary)	~ 0.64%	Red
Special (Exceedingly Rare - Knives/Gloves)	~ 0.26%	Gold

As the table highlights, gamers have approximately a 1 in 400 opportunity of unboxing a Gold product (Knives or Gloves). Moreover, within each tier, there is an extra coin toss regarding whether the product comes in **StatTrak™** condition (which tracks eliminates), taking place at a rate of 10% for any provided drop.

Outside Wear and Float Values

Unpacking a skin is just half the battle. Every weapon dropped from a case is assigned a **Float Value**-- a number between 0.00 and 1.00 that determines the physical wear and tear of the weapon.

The exterior conditions are classified into five unique tiers:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look pristine even at greater float values, while others look heavily battered. Moreover, specific high-tier knives and weapon patterns are greatly influenced by "Pattern Templates," making specific variations exceedingly unusual and important to collectors.



Techniques and Best Practices for Case Openings

While case opening is purely a game of chance, players can approach the mechanic responsibly and wisely by adhering to a few best practices.

1. Set a Strict Budget

The most crucial rule of opening CS2 cases is to deal with the cash spent as **home entertainment expenditure**, akin to purchasing a ticket to a motion picture or visiting a gambling establishment. Never ever spend money on cases that is needed for vital real-world costs.

2. Compare Buying vs. Unboxing
