- **API Restrictions:** Valve implemented trade hold restrictions, meaning traded products can not be traded again for 7 days. This considerably slowed down the automated depositing and withdrawing systems used by gambling sites.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has regularly targeted popular gambling operators with legal cautions, requiring numerous prominent sites to close down or change their business designs.
- **Account Bans:** Valve regularly bans trade bots and personal accounts associated with commercial gambling operations.

Despite these efforts, the industry adapts. Sites have shifted toward accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) or alternative payment processors alongside-- or totally in location of-- direct skin trading, enabling them to circumvent Steam's restrictions.
