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Guanfacine (Intuniv) Clonidine (Kapvay) Affect neurotransmitters differently; target receptors over a longer period. Titrated much more gradually; can take numerous weeks to show full effectiveness.

What to Expect During the Titration Process

Step 1: Baseline Assessment
