

Rekeying locks is often the quiet middle ground between doing nothing and replacing every piece of hardware on the door. When rekeying fits better than replacing

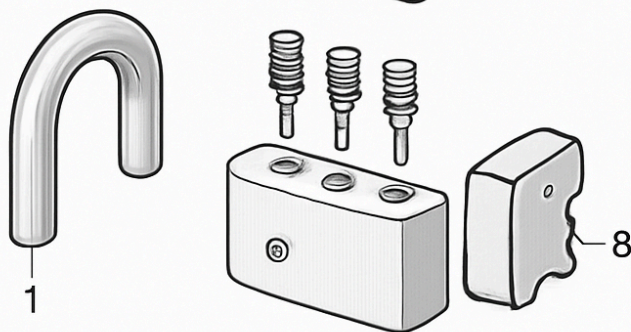
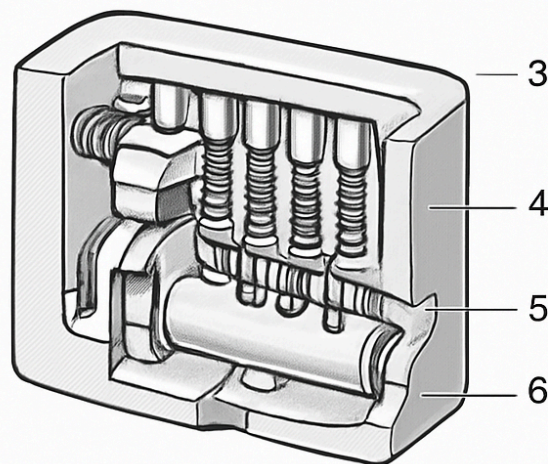
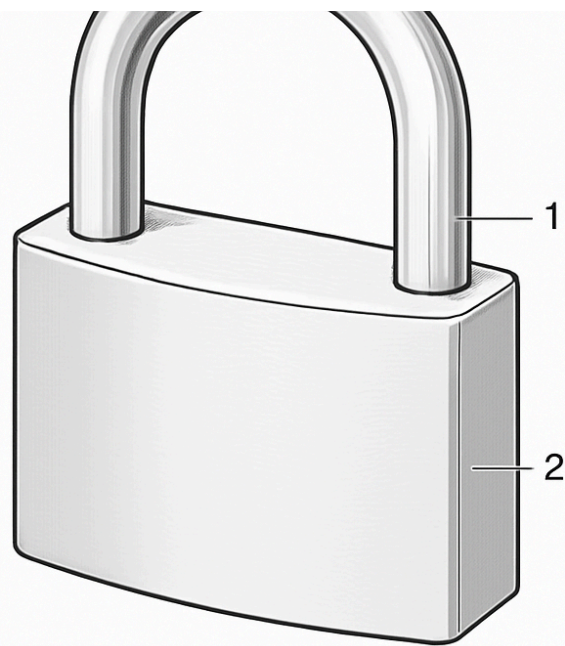
Why car lock and key problems need a separate approach
