- **Community Trust:** Established sites typically have active Discord neighborhoods or subreddits where users post their big wins (and losses), providing social evidence of the website's legitimacy.

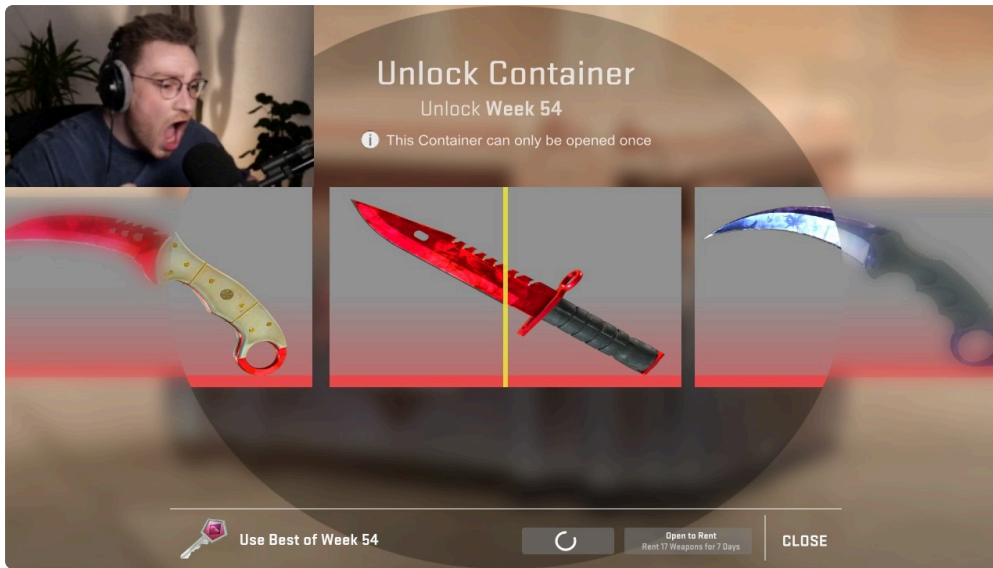
