Another big selling point for these mini-splits is the **pre-charged Quick Connect line set**. 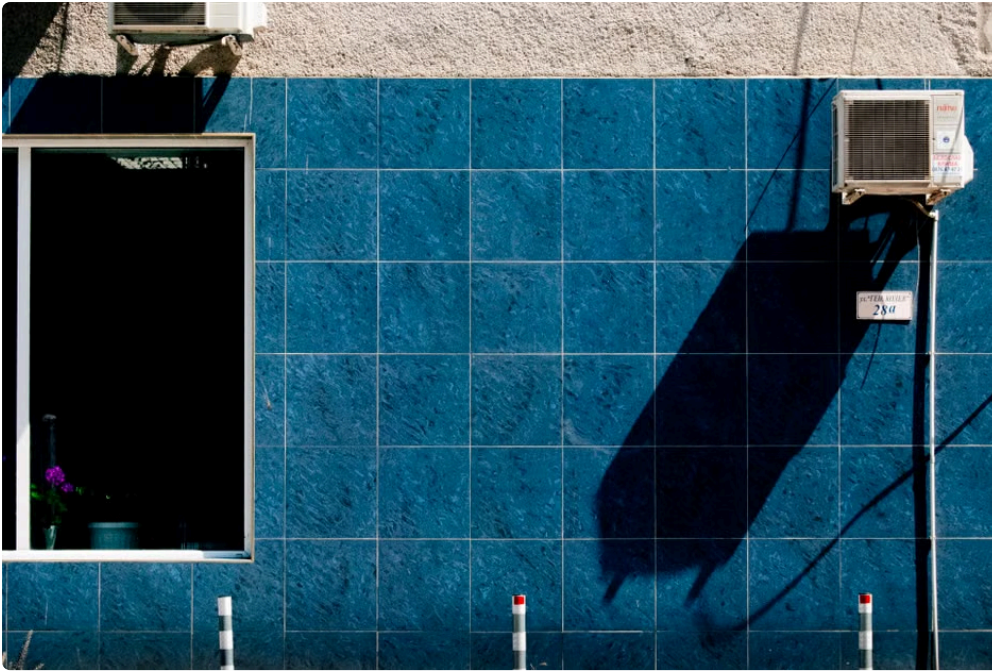
Before you buy, check if you possess the necessary credentials or if the brand allows a DIY install with a reduced warranty. Skipping this step can waste your investment should something go wrong.

For pure DIY simplicity with fewer warranty strings, MrCool might be the better choice despite a slightly higher price tag — but that's a different discussion.
