- **Wear Rating (Float Value):** A numerical value in between 0.00 and 1.00 that identifies how scratched or worn a skin looks. Lower floats mean cleaner surfaces, though some particular skins really look better (or are valued greater) with higher wear.
- **Pattern Index:** A seed number (from 1 to 1000) that determines how a texture is mapped onto a weapon. For particular skins, a specific pattern can place a rare style element-- like blue on a Case Hardened knife-- in prime presence.
- **StatTrak™ Technology:** An optional counter built into the weapon that digitally records the number of kills the owner accomplishes with it.
- **Keepsake Quality:** Items dropped solely throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors), including gold stickers honoring the match and teams.

The Wear Rating Hierarchy

Understanding skin wear is vital for anyone aiming to buy, sell, or trade. The wear condition is divided into 5 unique classifications:

Exterior Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with minimal to no scratches or blemishes.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Extremely light wear, generally little scratches noticeable just upon close examination.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear and tear, scratches on the body and paint cracking on edges.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, heavy scratching,

and visible fading of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Incredibly used, heavily faded, rusted, or scraped look.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not physically drop in Factory New condition because of how the texture is configured.

The Economics of the CS2 Marketplace

What separates Counter-Strike from many other video games is its open, player-driven economy. Valve developed a virtual environment where digital products hold real-world worth, sustained by the Steam Community Market and third-party trading platforms.

Elements Driving Skin Prices:

1. **Rarity and Drop Rates:** Just like physical trading cards, the chances of unboxing unusual items (like Covert rifles, knives, or gloves) from weapon cases are incredibly low.
2. **Supply and Demand:** If a particular case is no longer dropping in-game, the supply of its contained skins becomes limited, typically causing prices to rise over time.
3. **Expert Play (Esports):** When a professional gamer uses a particular skin during a major competition, demand for that item often surges over night.
4. **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade up 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier, completely taking in the input products and altering market products.

Popular CS2 Skin Categories and Themes

With countless alternatives available, neighborhood choices have coalesced around particular aesthetic styles. Developing a cohesive inventory is a popular leisure activity for dedicated players.



- **The "Loadout" Concepts:** Many players curate stocks based on a single color combination-- such as an all-blue inventory including the AK-47|Case Hardened, USP-S|Eliminate Confirmed, and M4A4|Desolate Space.
- **Covert Milestones:** High-tier weapons like the AWP|Asiimov, M4A1-S|Printstream, and Desert Eagle|Printstream act as status signs within matches.
- **Knives and Gloves:** The holy grail of CS2 gathering. Unusual knife finishes like Karambits, Butterfly Knives, and Bayanets coupled with matching Hand Wraps or Specialist Gloves can quickly cost thousands of dollars.

- **Research Float Values:** Do not blindly purchase a weapon labeled "Field-Tested." Check the precise float value, as a 0.15 float FT weapon looks nearly similar to a 0.07 MW weapon but usually costs significantly less.
- **Understand Market Volatility:** Treat digital skins primarily as entertainment possessions rather than ensured monetary investments. Valve updates, economic shifts, and video game spots can influence market value all of a sudden.
