

Hollyville has a character all its own. The roads may be quiet and the pace a little easier than in larger towns, but the weather here still works on every surface the same way it does across Sussex County. Humid summers leave behind a film of algae and grime. Pollen coats siding and porches in spring. Rain pushes dirt into corners where it settles and darkens. By the time a homeowner notices the change, the house has usually been telling the story for months.

The rinse is gentle, which helps prevent damage to siding laps, seals, window screens, and trim.

The right approach often comes down to one simple question: what do you want to remove, and what are you trying to protect? A driveway covered in oil spots needs a different treatment than cedar shake siding or a porch with peeling paint. Good cleaning work starts with that judgment, not with the machine.

Common trouble spots on Hollyville homes
