3. **API and Bot Restrictions:** Valve consistently withdraws the API keys of automated bots used by gambling platforms to process deposits and withdrawals.

Despite these efforts, operators continuously discover technical workarounds, moving towards decentralized payment models and P2P trading networks that do not rely on direct bot stocks.
