- **Scams and Phishing:** Always double-check URLs. Cybercriminals often develop phony look-alike websites to steal Steam login qualifications or API keys.
- **Platform Legitimization:** Stick to well-known, trustworthy platforms that have an enduring history within the Counter-Strike community and transparent confirmation systems (Provably Fair algorithms).
- **Steam Account Security:** Ensure Two-Factor Authentication (Steam Guard) is active at all times, and never ever accept trades from unverified bots.
