

Hollyville is the kind of place that rewards people who slow down long enough to notice it. It does not announce itself with a dense downtown or a long row of attractions, and that is part of its appeal. Set in Sussex County, Delaware, it sits in a landscape shaped less by dramatic landmarks than by practical life, fertile ground, country roads, small communities, and the steady pull of the nearby coast.
