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A healthy septic system is [septic tank maintenance](#) a quiet partner. When it works, you hardly consider it. When it stops working, you think of little else. A backup on a holiday weekend, a soggy patch over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these problems carry genuine expenses and a fair amount of stress. How a septic tank actually works
