

Melville sits in an interesting pocket of Long Island. It is not the kind of place that tries to impress you with spectacle, and that is part of its appeal. The community has a working rhythm to it, shaped by office parks, established neighborhoods, older properties, and the steady flow of people moving between the North Shore, the Deer Park corridor, and the wider Huntington area.
