

Bellville does not try to impress you all at once. That is part of its appeal. The town settles into the western edge of the Houston metro's orbit with a calm confidence, carrying the kind of history that reveals itself slowly, in courthouse facades, church steeples, family businesses, and neighborhoods where porches still matter.
