On the other hand, concrete walkways and garage pads can often handle stronger cleaning, especially when stains have been allowed to settle for months.

That difference is where experience matters. A skilled technician does not just point and spray. They assess oxidation on siding, chalking on painted surfaces, loose mortar on brick, and the likely source of discoloration. Green growth near a shaded side wall is not the same problem as rust marks near a downspout. Tire streaks on a driveway require a different approach from soot on a porch ceiling.

What Brentwood homes tend to need most

Roof washing and house washing, with restraint

The phrase “power washing” gets used loosely, but roof washing and house washing should always be handled with restraint. A roof is not a driveway. House washing also rewards a lighter touch. Siding, trim, windows, soffits, and vents all have different tolerances. A professional who understands exterior maintenance will usually rely on a measured mix of cleaning and rinsing, not brute force. That is especially important around older homes, where caulk lines may be tired and trim details may already be vulnerable.

A practical look at what to clean first
