1. Repairing a Sagging Door

- **Step 3:** Insert little pieces of wood (like toothpicks or wooden golf tees) coated in wood glue into the removed screw holes.
- **Step 4:** Once dry, cut the wood flush with the surface.
- **Step 5:** Reattach the hinge utilizing longer screws that can bite into the stud behind the door frame.

2. Removing Squeaks

This is the most convenient fix in home upkeep.

- Open the door and tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a nail and a hammer.
- Wipe the pin tidy with a rag to get rid of old, grimy grease.
- Coat the pin lightly with a multi-purpose lube or petroleum jelly.
- Reinsert the pin and swing the door back and forth a couple of times to distribute the lube.

3. Changing a Misaligned Latch

If your door declines to remain shut, the latch isn't aligning properly with the hole in the strike plate.

- **The Lipstick Trick:** Rub a little bit of lipstick or chalk on the door lock. Shut the door and attempt to latch it. The mark left on the door frame will show you precisely where the latch is striking.
- **The Fix:** Use a file to widen the strike plate hole, or loosen the strike plate and move it somewhat up or down to match the latch.
