- **Action 3: Adjust the Roller Height** Most moving glass doors have adjustment screws located near the bottom corners on the inside edge (typically concealed by small vinyl plugs). Using a screwdriver, turn the

screws clockwise to raise the door or counter-clockwise to reduce it. Adjust both sides evenly up until the door moves smoothly and sits level in the frame.

2. Fixing Sagging or Misaligned Hinged Glass Doors

Hinged glass doors-- such as interior glass doors or patio French doors-- frequently experience gravity. The heavy glass panel puts enormous pressure on the hinges, causing the door to droop and scrape versus the threshold.

- **Step 1: Inspect the Hinges**Open the door and examine the screws on all hinges. Typically, a drooping door is simply triggered by loose hinge screws pulling away from the door frame.
- **Step 2: Tighten or Replace Screws**Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have ended up being stripped (indicating the screw spins without tightening), eliminate the screw, insert a little piece of wood toothpick or a wall anchor into the hole together with wood glue, and then re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
- **Action 3: Adjust Hinge Tension or Position**If tightening the screws does not resolve the sag, adjust the particular change screws found on modern adjustable hinges, or utilize a shim behind the bottom hinge to push the door back into alignment.

3. Changing Worn Weatherstripping

If a glass door allows cold drafts during winter season or allows conditioned air to get away in the summertime, the weatherstripping has actually likely degraded.

- **Step 1: Remove Old Weatherstripping**Peel away the old rubber, vinyl, or felt weatherstripping from the door frame or the edge of the door. Utilize a putty knife to scrape away any lingering adhesive residue.
- **Action 2: Clean the Surface**Wipe down the application area with rubbing alcohol to ensure a tidy, dust-free surface for the brand-new adhesive.
- **Action 3: Install the New Material**Procedure the boundary of the door frame and cut the brand-new weatherstripping to size. Press firmly into location, making sure a tight seal when the door is closed without making it excessively challenging to latch.
