The winner's stock is quickly credited with each and every single skin dropped in the battle (both their own and their opponents').

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

- **1v1 Classic:** A direct head-to-head fight. Winner takes all.

The Pros:

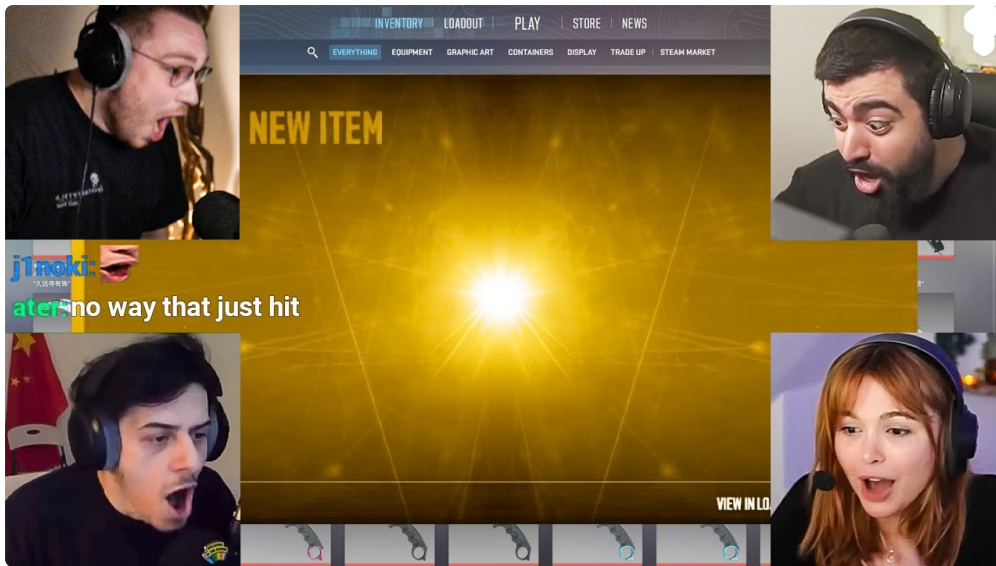
