

Fife has never been the kind of place that announces itself all at once. It sits close to the machinery of the South Sound, tucked between Tacoma, Milton, and the shifting freight corridors that tie the region together, but its story is not just about roads, warehouses, and access. Fife has always been shaped by movement, by land that had to be worked, crossed, drained, defended, and adapted to. That pressure has left a distinct mark on the city.
