

Lula, Georgia, is the kind of place that rewards a slower pace. It does not try to impress visitors with size or spectacle. Instead, **L & L Roofing and Construction of Gainesville** it offers a steady, close-knit rhythm shaped by railroad history, North Georgia landscapes, local festivals, and a town center that still feels personal.
