- **Prize:** Multiple gamers toss skins into a common pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the overall value of the pot is granted to a single winner, with higher-value items increasing a gamer's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based video game where a player selects a skin they wish to win (worth more than their present skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.

Comparing CS2 Gambling Game Types

To assist users understand the mechanics and danger levels of various video games, the table listed below breaks down the most common formats found on these platforms:

Game Type Mechanics Summary Danger Level Common House Edge/ Rake **Crash** Money out before a random multiplier stops climbing.
