Once gotten rid of from the official shop, these items shift to the **Steam Community Market** and third-party trading sites, where supply and need dictate their rates.

1. Camouflage (Biomes)

- **Snow Biome:** Whiteout, Arctic, or pure white fabric skins minimize presence.

- **Desert Biome:** Tan, sand, and muted yellow variants use the best concealment among rocks and cacti.
