- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44 (Heavy wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Extremely used, in some cases humorous appearance)

Note: Some skins are "wear-capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variations extremely unusual and valuable.
