- 1. The Steam Item Store:** Every Thursday, Facepunch launches a new batch of community-created skins picked by the designers. Purchasing them directly from the store guarantees the base rate (usually between £ 0.99 and £ 2.99).
- 2. The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have actually been bought or dropped, players can purchase and sell them easily on the Steam Market. Prices are dictated by supply and demand, suggesting unusual or popular skins can increase in worth.
- 3. Random In-Game Drops:** Simply using authorities or community servers grants random item drops over time, though these are generally lower-tier typical or unusual items.

4. **Jerk Drops:** Facepunch frequently partners with popular content creators to provide exclusive, time-limited skins for audiences who enjoy participating streams.
