

Moving day can be both thrilling and overwhelming. Why a Room Label System Is Your Best Friend

One of my biggest pet peeves when coordinating moves is discovering that boxes are labeled by contents ("Books," "Kitchenware," "Tools") rather than by their destination room ("Living Room," "Master Bedroom," "Garage"). This seemingly small oversight can cascade into a chaotic unpacking process and costly delays.

The simplest solution? Use a **room label system** paired with color coding that instantly tells movers where each box belongs. Here's how to make it work:

- **Assign each room a color.** For example, blue painter's tape for the kitchen, green for bedrooms, red for the living room, etc. The colors should be distinct and consistent.
- **Label each box boldly with both the room name and a brief note of contents.** For example, "Master Bedroom – Bedding, Pillows." I keep a stash of painter's tape handy for this purpose—it sticks well and is easy to write on.
- **Create a master list of box numbers and corresponding rooms.** This *master list box rooms* is your move inventory and tracking tool. Assign numbers or codes to boxes along with their color labels to make inventory matching a breeze.

This system keeps movers from fumbling around looking for where each box should go, which can otherwise waste valuable time—especially in buildings with tight access like condos.

Cut Costs and Unpacking Time with Decluttering

Before you even start labeling boxes, take a hard look at what you plan to move. Decluttering is one of the smartest, yet most overlooked, ways to simplify moving logistics.

Carrying fewer boxes and bulky furniture means less labor, less risk of damage, and often a smaller moving truck fee. Plus, after the move, you'll face less unpacking and organizing, which means you settle into your new home faster.

Tip: Sort your belongings into bins labeled keep, donate, recycle, and trash long before move day. Moving companies like **Southside Moving** can sometimes advise on best practices to keep non-essential items out of the truck.

Understand Non-Allowables and Safety-Based Exclusions

Not all household items can be moved—particularly by professional movers regulated by the **Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA)**. Flammable liquids, propane tanks, aerosol cans, certain chemicals, and other hazardous materials are typically prohibited for safety reasons.



Knowing what can't go into the moving truck helps you avoid last-minute surprises and delays—like getting a call first thing on move day because a box contains paint or lighter fluid.

The FMCSA provides crucial informational materials, including the *Your Rights and Responsibilities When You Move* booklet and the handy *Ready to Move* brochure. Plan Ahead for Truck Parking and Building Access

Before you even talk boxes, ask yourself: *Where will the moving truck park?* This is a critical question I always ask clients upfront. A guaranteed parking spot near your entry can simplify logistics immensely.

Whether you live in a single-family home with ample driveway space or a condo requiring elevator bookings, securing a parking permit or loading zone access in advance can mean the difference between a smooth move and costly waiting times for movers.

Also consider the following:

- Does your condo or apartment require advance elevator reservations?
- Are there any building restrictions on move-in/out hours?
- Will multiple trips be needed if access is limited?

Communicating these logistical issues up front with your moving company, like **Southside Moving**, ensures a coordinated approach and timely move day execution.

Measure Large Furniture and Exits Before the Move

One surprisingly common hiccup is discovering a sofa won't clear the front door or that a dresser won't fit in the elevator.

Before the big day, measure your largest pieces of furniture—including height, width, and depth—then compare those dimensions with all exit points, elevator openings, and stairwell widths.

This simple step saves frustration and damages—and sometimes even allows you to plan for disassembly ahead of time.
