Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or wear. Typically commands the highest rate.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Minor blemishes, small scratches, or minor paint cracking, often just noticeable upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and notable paint loss around the edges and high-friction locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Extremely used, heavily faded, and sometimes significantly altered look. Some collectors specifically look for extreme BS floats for a "blackimov" result.

Beyond basic wear, some skins also include a **StatTrak**™ innovation module, which tracks the number of kills a player gets with that specific weapon, including a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in numerous other contemporary video games, CS2 skins possess real-world financial worth because they are completely tradeable and marketable. Gamers can buy, offer, and trade items by means of the Steam Community Market or through reputable third-party markets using real currency or cryptocurrencies.

Several factors dictate the price of a CS2 skin:

1. **Rarity:** Classified by color tiers-- Consumer (white), Industrial (light blue), Mil-Spec (dark blue), Restricted (purple), Classified (pink), Covert (red), and Extra-Ordinary (gold/yellow for knives and gloves).
