Low to Medium **Case Opening** Simulates the video game's official loot boxes, permitting gamers to open curated cases with predetermined odds for rare items. High **Coinflip** A direct, player-versus-player (PvP) game where 2 users bet skins of equal worth on a 50/50 coin toss. Very Low (takes a little skin commission) **Jackpot** Several gamers swimming pool skins into a central pot. A virtual ticket system figures out a single winner based upon the percentage of overall value contributed. Low (takes a portion commission)

The Mechanics: How CSGO Gambling Works

To take part in CSGO gambling, users normally follow a standardized procedure:
