2. Medium Tanks (20 to 55 Gallons)

- **40 Gallon Breeder:** Often called the "breeder" tank, this is widely regarded by enthusiasts as one of the very best proportions in the aquarium hobby. It has a large bottom footprint relative to its height, making it perfect for bottom-dwelling fish, reptiles, or densely planted aquascapes.
- **55 Gallon:** The classic rectangle-shaped tank. A 55-gallon gives keepers the capability to blend several types, create striking mid-sized neighborhood tanks, or keep reasonably sized cichlids. Nevertheless, note that a 55-gallon is relatively narrow front-to-back, which can restrict aquascaping depth.

3. Large and Giant Tanks (75 Gallons and Up)

- **Readily Available Space and Maintenance Access:** Consider the physical measurements. Will the tank fit through entrances throughout a relocation? Exists sufficient clearance above the tank to perform water changes, gravel vacuuming, and filter upkeep?
- **Budget:** Larger tanks need bigger heaters, more powerful filters, more substrate, and more decorative aspects. Continuous costs (electrical power, water conditioner, fish food) also scale up with tank size.
