Moisture gets behind the surface. Then winter arrives, and the freeze-thaw cycle forces that moisture to expand. One cold snap can do more damage than several months of visible neglect.

Even patios and driveways can suffer if water is allowed to pool along edges or under pavers. The best masonry work in this climate anticipates that movement.
