- **Crazy Mode:** Special modifiers are applied, such as perk multiplier payments or randomized item swaps.

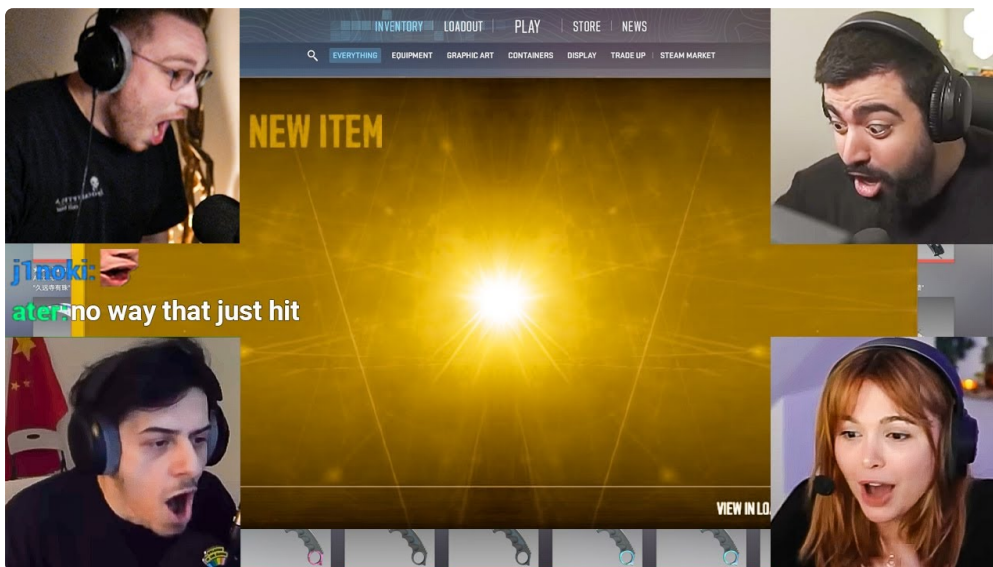
Comparing Traditional Openings vs. Case Battles
