From a purely mathematical standpoint, opening CS2 cases is a type of negative-expected-value entertainment. Since the large bulk of items dropped are Mil-Spec (blue) or Restricted (purple) skins that sell for cents on the Steam Community Market, the average monetary return per case opened is considerably lower than the £ 2.50 expense of the key.
