- **API Restrictions:** By restricting automated trade bots and imposing trade cooldowns, Valve has made it considerably harder for platforms to process instant deposits and withdrawals.
- **Account Bans:** Users caught using their Steam inventories for business gambling operations risk having their personal Steam accounts permanently prohibited, leading to the loss of their whole video game and skin libraries.

In spite of these efforts, the need remains so high that brand-new platforms constantly emerge to change those that shut down.
