- **Security:** A loose lock, a broken pane, or a rotten wooden frame makes it incredibly simple for trespassers to get.

- **Prevention of Water Damage:** Leaky windows and doors invite moisture into the walls, leading to mold development, wood rot, and compromised structural integrity.

Common Window Problems and Solutions

Windows sustain extreme temperature level variations, wind, rain, and UV direct exposure daily. Consequently, they present an unique set of upkeep challenges.

1. Drafty Windows

If you feel a chill near your windows even when they are shut tight, the weatherstripping or caulking has likely weakened.

- **The Fix:** Remove old, brittle caulk around the outside frame and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone. Change worn-out foam or vinyl weatherstripping along the sash tracks.

2. Foggy Glass (Failed Insulated Units)

Modern double- or triple-pane windows feature a sealed gas layer for insulation. When the seal fails, condensation kinds *in between* the panes, developing a permanent haze.



- **The Fix:** In many cases, the insulated glass system (IGU) should be changed instead of the entire window frame. A professional glazier can quickly swap out the glass pane.

3. Stuck Windows

Paint buildup, deformed wooden frames, or dirt in the tracks can cause windows to jam.

- **The Fix:** Thoroughly clean the tracks and use a silicone-based lube. If the wood has inflamed due to humidity, cautious sanding might be needed once the wood dries out.

Common Door Problems and Solutions

Doors experience mechanical tension from constant opening, closing, slamming, and twisting.

1. Squeaky or Sagging Hinges

In time, the weight of a heavy door pulls on the hinge screws, causing the door to droop and scrape against the floor or frame.

- **The Fix:** Tighten loose screw holes by replacing brief screws with longer ones that reach into the tough wall stud. For squeaks, apply a few drops of light-weight machine oil or silicone spray to the hinge pins.

2. Damaged Door Jambs and Wood Rot

Exterior doors exposed to heavy rain frequently experience wood rot at the bottom of the jambs and threshold.

- **The Fix:** For minor rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat the area with a wood hardener, and fill it with exterior wood epoxy. If the rot is comprehensive, the whole jamb assembly need to be replaced.

3. Faulty Latches and Locks

If a door declines to stay latched, the strike plate on the frame is likely misaligned with the latch bolt.

- **The Fix:** Unscrew the strike plate and utilize a file to expand the hole, or rearrange the plate slightly up or down to line up perfectly with the lock.

Repair vs. Replacement: Making the Right Call
