

A shoreline community shaped by work, water, and repetition

Hampton Bays has always made sense as a place where people came to get things done. Long before it became known as a summer destination or a practical stop between the more polished East End villages, it was a working stretch of land tied to marsh, inlet, bay, and season. That matters, because the town's character still reflects the habits of a place that had to earn its keep.
