

Understanding CS: GO Crash Gambling: Mechanics, Risks, and Responsible Play

The Role of Skins and In-Game Items

- **Psychological escalation:** Feeling anxious, mad, or euphoric during gameplay.

- **Disregarding obligations:** Missing work, school, or individual responsibilities because of play.
