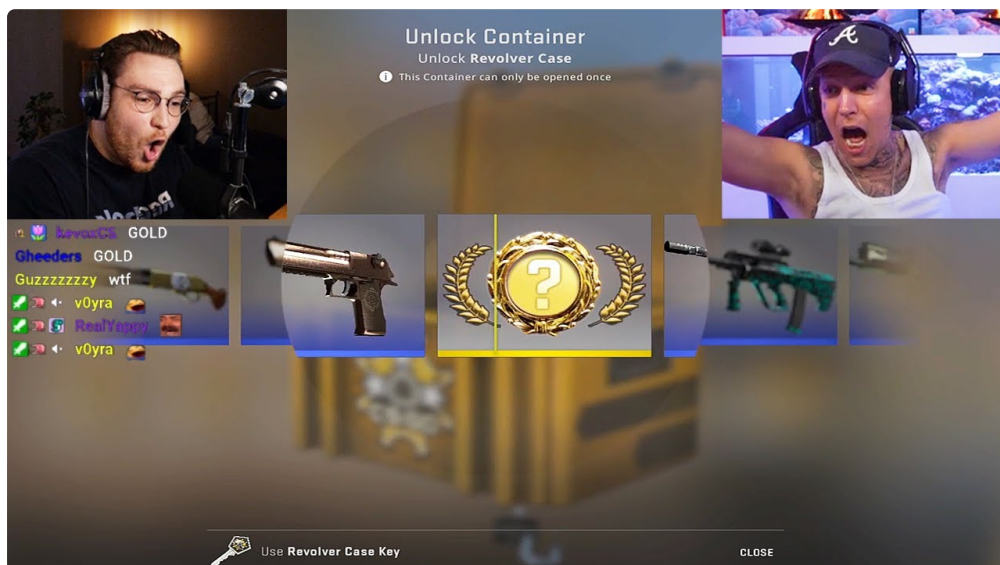
Popular Game Modes in Case Battles
