- **Coinflip:** A timeless 1v1 video game where two gamers wager equivalent skin worths, and a digital coin flip determines the sole winner.

- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers dump skins into a typical pot. A virtual wheel spins, and the person who contributed the most has the highest analytical possibility of winning the entire pool, though luck can favor low-tier contributors.

## Contrast of Common CS: GO Gambling Game Types
