1. The DreamHack/ Operation Hydra Era (The Classics)

- **The Active Drop Pool vs. Rare Drop Pool:** When a case is moved to the "Rare Drop Pool" (terminated active drop), its supply stops increasing organically. Consequently, as gamers open them gradually, the staying supply shrinks, and the cost of the case typically escalates.
- **Drift Values and Wear:** Every skin is assigned a float value ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, determining its condition (Factory New, Minimal Wear, Field-Tested, Well-Worn, and Battle-Scarred).
- **The Trade-Up Contract:** Players can trade 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next higher tier, supplying a secondary usage for undesirable, low-tier case drops.
