2. Wear Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is assigned a Float Value ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, which identifies its physical wear and tear. This system guarantees that no 2 skins look entirely identical.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight imperfections, minor wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint missing in essential locations)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily eroded, in some cases changing the skin's appearance completely)

Note: Some skins are "capped," indicating they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly unusual and important.

The Virtual Economy: Why Are Skins So Expensive?

To an outsider, spending hundreds-- or even thousands-- of dollars on a digital knife or rifle texture sounds ridiculous. Nevertheless, the CS: GO skin economy runs similar to the real-world stock market or art market. A number of financial principles drive these costs:
