

Henrietta, NY Weather Overview

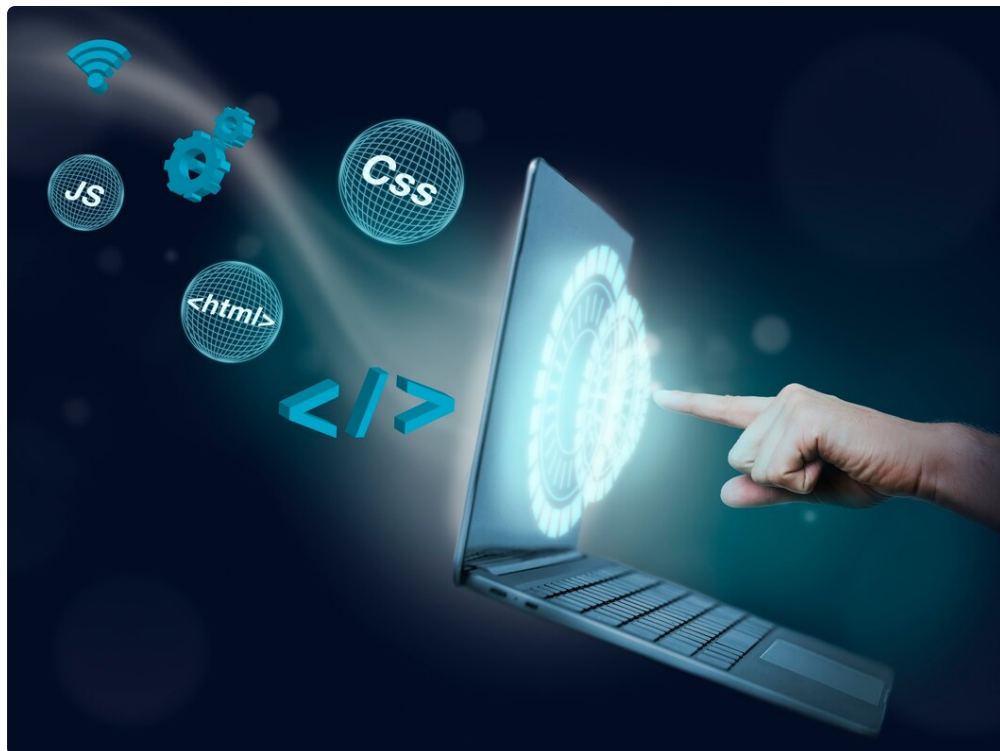
