

Knoxville sits in a rare middle ground. It is old enough to carry the weight of river commerce, rail yards, and brick warehouses, yet lively enough to keep reinventing itself block by block. Walk through Old City at dusk and you can feel that tension in the best possible way. Gaslamp-style fixtures throw warm light across red brick façades, live music leaks from open doors, and the sidewalks hold the kind of wear that only comes from decades of use.
